



THAT INFAMOUS LOGO



Procter & Gamble's moon-and-stars logo began as a crude cross¹ and evolved into a mockery of Revelation 12:1.² The thirteen stars represent the thirteen letters of Procter & Gamble,³ and Satan can be found between Procter & Gamble in English gematria simplex.⁴ The two horns like a lamb are those of the false prophet,⁵ and the reversed 666 is a reflection of the beast.⁶ The logo is the allegorical confirmation that the manifestation of evil is institutional.⁷
